

Programme change proposals

At York each degree programme has its own, tailored set of distinctive learning outcomes. These won't change, no matter what your location or mode of delivery, and our academics are working hard to ensure your programmes and modules next year continue to inspire and motivate you.

Your health and safety is our number one priority and in light of the Covid-19 pandemic we have needed to make changes to some of your programmes of study for the coming academic year. This document summarises the changes that are proposed.

Programme(s) <u>Undergraduate and MEnv programmes in Environment and Geography</u>

Summary of Overall Plans

- Students on our BSc/BA/MEnv programmes will experience a combination of online and face-to-face learning activities in 20/21.
- Lectures will be pre-recorded and put on the VLE. In all modules students will be invited to participate in 'lecture-linked' online or face-to-face discussion sessions to consolidate learning in one or more lectures.
- Small group teaching will be done either face-to-face or online.
- Where students are unable to attend campus for face-to-face teaching, appropriate alternative learning resources/ activities will be provided.
- The sequence of study has been adjusted to allow the majority of field and laboratory
 activities to take place in the spring and summer terms when we hope to be able to work
 with fewer social distancing restrictions. This means that some modules have moved
 terms and some have been restructured. If social distancing rules are not relaxed we may
 need to offer engaging online alternatives to spring/summer field and laboratory activities
 instead.
 - In order to maintain credit balance/ workload across terms, it hasn't been possible to move all modules with field trips to later in the academic year. A small number of autumn-term field trips will be delivered in an engaging virtual format.
- All autumn term computing practicals will take place online. We hope to be able to run some spring and summer term computing practicals face-to-face but, if social distancing rules are not relaxed, we may need to run all of these sessions online instead.
- You will continue to be assessed through a combination of coursework, oral presentations and open, online exams. We have made changes to assessments in some modules.

Specific assessment plans for each module will be available by the start of the academic year.

Programme Structures

Modules moving between terms:

We've moved some modules between terms to give us the best chance of delivering field and laboratory activities face-to-face, redistribute face-to-face teaching and balance credit load. We will be in touch with any students where the sequencing changes have resulted in an uneven workload between terms to discuss option choices.

• List of Modules which have moved terms to allow the majority of field and laboratory activities to take place later in the academic year:

'Dynamic Earth' - moved from autumn/spring to the spring/summer 'Ecological Principles' - moved from autumn/spring to spring/summer

• List of modules which have moved to the autumn term to increase the amount of face-to-face teaching available to students when social-distancing restrictions are likely to be tighter:

'Frontiers in Environmental Research' - moved from spring to autumn (Environmental Science)

Further changes or information of note

- We are currently planning to run residential field courses from the end of the spring and start of the summer terms in 20/21 but will need to keep this decision under review as Government advice on Covid-19 changes. If social distancing rules are not relaxed, suitable engaging alternative learning opportunities will be offered to ensure programme learning outcomes are met.
- We will be running (optional) extracurricular interdisciplinary, 'futures thinking'
 workshops during the autumn term. This will give students the opportunity to come
 together with others from across our programmes/ year groups to further develop their
 skills and knowledge through working on real-world environmental sustainability
 problems. The workshops will be offered in both face-to-face and online formats.
- We will be working with the Institution of Environmental Sciences (IES) to ensure students are able to meet accreditation requirements.
