# Philosophy

## Summary of Overall Plans (Philosophy)

For modules with lectures, lecture material will be recorded and made available online for you to watch at a time that suits you. We will typically record the material in manageable chunks and post it on the VLE.

For the vast majority of modules with lectures and seminars, or just seminars, we expect to provide regular, frequent face-to-face seminars for all on-campus students. Wherever possible, seminars will follow the same pattern as they would have done pre-pandemic: typically, weekly. Face-to-face seminars will also often be in smaller groups than would previously have been the case.

For students unable to be on campus, we will provide an online seminar for every module.

The length, content and frequency of the online seminar will replicate that of the module's face-to-face seminars, to ensure that students attending in this way are able to meet module and programme learning outcomes.

We will also provide 'bridging' activities in addition to seminars and recorded lecture material. These may vary from module to module but might include quizzes or worksheets. These bridging activities will compensate for a lack of interaction in lectures, as well as ensuring that students are well prepared for seminars. Office hours will also be held, either face-to-face, or online.

We do not expect that most on-campus students will be participating frequently in online seminars. However, we will make sure that students and staff are prepared to transfer from a face-to-face to an online seminar, in case the need arises—for example, if students or staff need to self-isolate, or in case of local lockdown.

Teaching in Philosophy modules in Summer Term — which was entirely online — was in general very well received. Student feedback was positive, with feedback scores overall as high as for modules in Summer 2019. Student comments indicate that live online seminars, and the other measures we introduced to provide excellent learning opportunities, worked well. We don't currently anticipate having to do a lot of non-lecture teaching online, but we're confident that we can teach well online if it's needed.

We will continue to assess students through a combination of essays and online exams. Details of assessment plans for each module will be available by the start of term.

Programme Structures (Philosophy)

We are not planning to make any changes to programme structures in Autumn term 2020/21: we do not plan to cancel any modules or move them between terms.

# Proposed changes to Sociology first year modules

### Seminars

If you are joining us in September as a first year student reading for one of the degrees listed above, we plan to offer you the opportunity to have regular in-person seminars as in normal times. This will take the form of real-time seminars using our Virtual Learning Environment (VLE) platform. This will be a great way to engage with other students and with your seminar leaders and has much of the feel of in-person teaching. To help you make the most of these opportunities, we will show you how to use this platform. You will be invited to sign up for them in week 1 of the new term.

### Lectures

All of our lectures that we would normally give each week in large lecture theatres across the campus will instead be available for you to watch as 'lecturecasts'. Each of these 'lecturecasts' will be fully accessible and will provide you with essential knowledge in preparation for the seminars and the readings that we will ask you to do each week.

# **Proposed changes to Sociology second year modules**

If you are returning to York for the second year of your degree, we are making plans to change how we teach your chosen programmes in the following ways.

## Core modules:

Doing Research (for all degrees),

*Crime, Culture and Social Change* (for BA Criminology and BA Sociology with Criminology students) *Critical and Creative Approaches to Social Psychology* (for BA Sociology with Social Psychology students).

#### Seminars

We plan to offer you regular in-person seminars for the core modules that you will be taking.

## **Dissertation Lectures**

All of the five lectures that we provide in the autumn term to help you make a great start on your dissertation will be available for you to watch as 'lecturecasts'. Each of these 'lecturecasts' will be fully accessible and will be a great resource for you to access.

# Individual supervisions for dissertations

To support you with your dissertation research, we provide you with six hours of dedicated individual supervision. You can expect that in the autumn term your supervisions will take online with your allocated supervisor (using Zoom or similar platform).

# **Tutorials**
