### Proposed changes to our first year modules

#### **Seminars**

If you are joining us in September as a first year student reading for one of the degrees listed above, we plan to offer you the opportunity to have regular in-person seminars as in normal times. We know that starting your degree is an exciting but also challenging time, so we wish to provide you with as much in-person contact time as possible.

### What if I cannot attend these seminars in person?

If you are not able to join us on campus and take part in these seminars, because you are shielding, self-isolating or unable to travel, we will provide high quality learning opportunities online. This will take the form of real-time seminars using our Virtual Learning Environment (VLE) platform. This will be a great way to engage with other students and with your seminar leaders and has much of the feel of in-person teaching. To help you make the most of these opportunities, we will show you how to use this platform.

You will be invited to sign up for an online seminar group in week 1 of the new term. Also, if your circumstances change, you will be able to transfer into an online group after that time.

#### Lectures

All of our lectures that we would normally give each week in large lecture theatres across the campus will instead be available for you to watch as 'lecturecasts'. Each of these 'lecturecasts' will be fully accessible and will provide you with essential knowledge in preparation for the seminars and the readings that we will ask you to do each week.

## **Programme Structures**

We are not intending to make any changes to the programme structure for any of the undergraduate degrees we are responsible for running in our Department (so this excludes BA Philosophy/Sociology, BA Social and Political Sciences and BA Social and Political Sciences with Philosophy). We are not planning to withdraw any of the modules that we currently offer or to transfer any modules across the teaching terms.

## Further changes or information of note

Our plan is for meetings with academic supervisors to take place online as will office hours, during which module leaders and other members of the teaching staff will be available to give you feedback on your learning, discuss assessments, or other issues.

Therefore, all of the plans that we are making could change if local circumstances demand it or Government advice changes on physical distancing.
